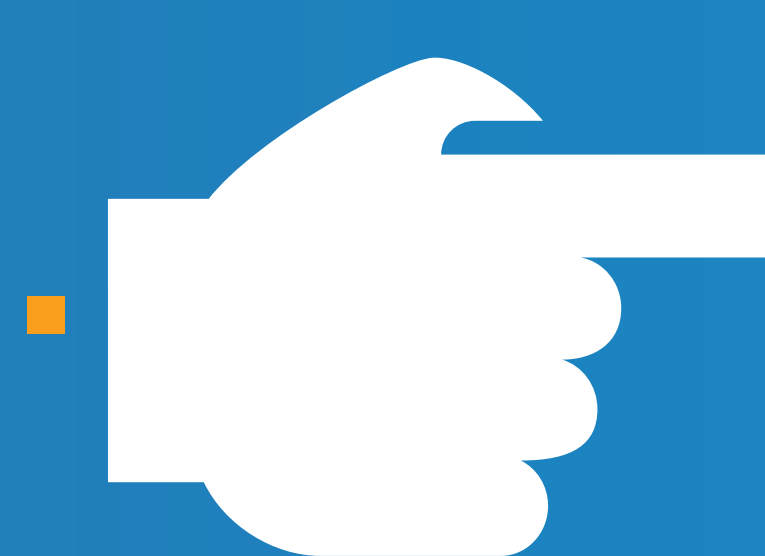


We have already met the 2017 regional goal of reducing hepatitis B infection in 5-year-old children to less than 1%

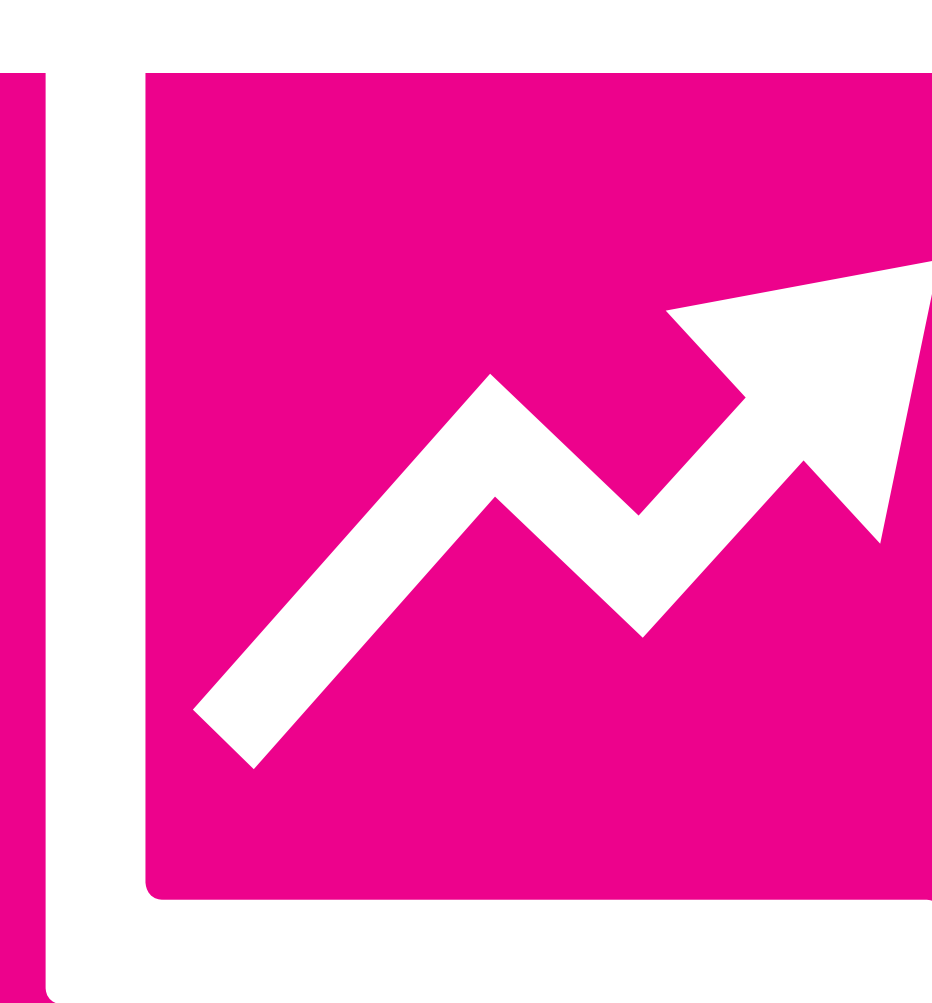

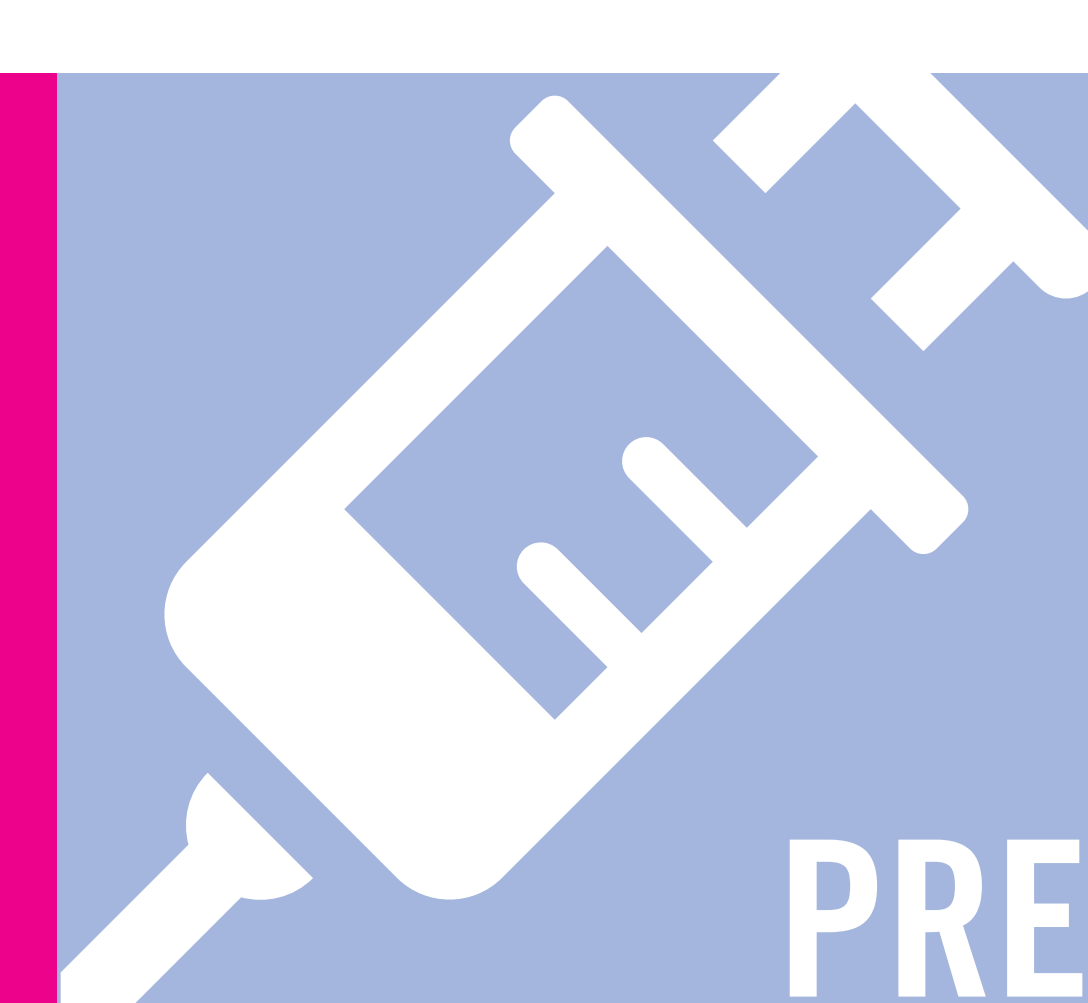
